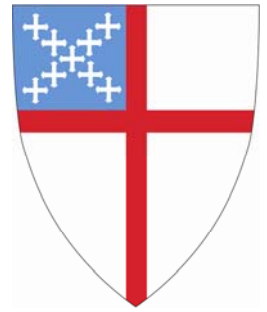

FROM THE RECTOR:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Change is in the air! As the leaves change and then fall, and as the wind becomes brisk, I find myself rejoicing in the change of seasons that happens in Iowa. My rejoicing and pleasure comes from the knowledge that as the seasons change so does the focus of our church. In the midst of this seasonal change from fall to winter, the church welcomes the transition into Advent. Advent is the season in which we prepare to welcome our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ into the world. In it, we hear the call of the angel, telling us that our savior draws near and we travel with Joseph and Mary on their journey toward the salvation of all.

Birth is, as I have said before, something that we know well at Trinity because birth and new life is something with which we have had a lot of practice. Over the course of my ministry, we have baptized and welcomed a lot of babies! This year alone we have welcomed five new children into our mix; some are newborns and some are adopted, all have been received and welcomed. This weekend we baptize two children, Tristan and Anna, and we will formally adopt them into our lives just as Christ has adopted us. The baptisms combined with Advent's approach call us to answer some hard questions about who we are, and how we will prepare for this adoption and our future.

I see and experience Trinity as a welcoming and exciting place. I see us as a place where all people are welcomed, and I see in our life together diverse people, participating in worship, ministry, pastoral care, leadership, and mission. I also, and perhaps because of these things, see Trinity as a place of potential. I see potential and know that there is an evangelism field of which we have only scratched the surface. I know that we can invite more folks into our midst, and I know that there are folks hungry for a church that will accept them, know them, and walk with them throughout their lives.

I also see potential in our children. Our children are beautiful, energetic, and fun and in them, I see the best of our present and our greatest hope for the future. Did you know that currently we have 15 children in our midst under the age of five! Beyond this, we have elementary schoolers, middle schoolers, and high schoolers all of whom come in and out of our doors on a regular basis. Many of you know that I have welcomed Tom Early into our midst as an intern working with our youth and young people. He will need our support as it is in servicing these young people that I see our greatest challenge and responsibility. As we enter into both a time of stewardship and a time of preparation, I invite you to think and pray about how our church could do better in these ministries. When you come up with something, I invite you to move beyond the suggestion realm and take action, for all of us have promised, for most of these kids, to support and guide them during their baptisms.

For our stewardship campaign, we must work hard on two fronts. First, we must work to retire the debt. Last year we paid over \$30,000 on our building, but your gifts are still needed as we have 7 years to pay off the remaining \$173,000. Kathleen Sallee and her team are working hard on the building campaign, soliciting pledges and answering questions so that we can make our 22,000 a year payment with the required 4.5% interest by June 7. So far this year we are behind where we need to be in terms of those payments, and while we are not as far behind as we were last year we are not out of the woods. If you have pledged, thank you for your gifts and your intention to give. If you have not, in the spirit of preparation please allow me to tell you why I see it as important to pay down this debt.

I give to the building fund not because I voted for it (I wasn't here yet), or because when I interviewed here I supported the preschool (those who knew me then knew how I felt), but because seven years from now those four and five year olds will be 11 and 12! My son is in this group. As he is in this group, I have to ask and wonder, what mission will we be able to do for them in their late elementary school and early middle school days? What will we do with our then high schoolers? Will they be able to go on mission trips? Will they be able to have a youth director? Will we have the programming to fit their needs? \$30,000 a year could go a long way toward the Christian future of our children! It can go along ways toward bettering the safe space that our church needs to be in their lives. It could go a long way in terms of supplying all parties with mutual spiritual joy as we watch these children begin to turn into young men and women.

Excellent Christian education is an absolutely necessary piece of church programming and in order to grow our church both physically and spiritually we must prepare a way for us to accept the growth that we have had. We need to prepare financially for these 15 children to enter into the next stage of their lives. The money that we give now in order to alleviate our debt can free our church in its future. We must prepare to welcome one of the largest Episcopal youth groups in the state. It's hard to believe that Denise and I have been here for coming up on 5 years. Time truly does fly. It seems like only a moment ago that I was 24 and signing my contract here, 25 and being ordained. The next generation will be here soon; they will need to be fed. Retiring our debt is something that we need to do in order to live more fully into their future in a way that we all know that we should.

The second place where we need your gifts is in our annual stewardship campaign. Carol Houk and her team are working on this. One of my goals as I became rector here was to end the dependence on our endowment. In all honesty, this goal has been a failure, as we have relied on it more heavily than ever before, but changes have been made. The preschool is now breaking even—covering payroll, payroll taxes, and its bills. In 2011, we will prepare for the preschool to begin to pay for its share of the utilities and some of the interest on our loan. This is a huge step and for this step we owe Mary Beth Wood and her staff of teachers a great debt of gratitude. We also owe a debt of gratitude to Denise Smith, Jerry Raber, and Amanda Kline, who have been on our preschool board from the worst of times until now. In truth, two years ago the risk to keep the preschool open felt to me like a gamble in which I felt we the church were gambling our future. Now I see it as an integral part of our present.

However, we have much more to do. In order to accomplish a balanced budget, our giving has to be increased and that means that in your eyes it must be a place that is worthy of your tithe, your 10%. Have we at Trinity celebrated the marriage of you or one of your loved ones? Have we buried them? Have we baptized one of your children or grandchildren? Have we allowed you to live a deeper, happier, more meaningful life with your Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit? Have we welcomed you, loved you, nourished you? Have we sat in the bed next to you or a loved one while sick? Prayed on your behalf, or held your hand in an intensive care unit, while you or a loved one was getting ready for surgery? Have we provided coats, clothes, clean water, food, care, rides, and or bus tickets to those in need? Have we begun to make an impact in our community, by partnering in education and serving our fellow man? Have we sent you or your children on mission trips? Have we listened to you, offered you a safe place, and encouraged you? Have we been a good church in the full meaning of the word no matter how you might define it? If your answer to some or all of these questions is yes, I hope you will consider a pledge to ensure that it continues to happen. I hope that in that pledge you would consider taking the leap of faith that is tithing. If your answer is no, please know that I am personally very sorry and please know that I am always willing to talk, repent, and I am willing to try to serve you better, just please let me know.

Trinity has been a remarkable place in the life of my family and me. It is a safe place for my children, it is a place where I have learned a lot, and it is a place where I have seen Denise do amazing ministry through Caritas Closet and her involvement on the preschool board. It is a place that we have personally invested in; in that investment we have received a great return. I believe that we walk closer to God as we have walked closer with you all. I believe that we have seen our passions flourish into growth, and I believe we have been loved and accepted. The Smiths give because we see a commitment to mission, to care, and to Word, and Sacrament. We give because we see the hope of the couples about to be wed like John and Tiffany, Kay and Jason, Matt and Amanda. We give because of the witness of Ginny, of Jan, of Tammy and Randy, we give because of the love the we see in the Niemans, and we give because of the dedication and passion that you all have shared with each other, your community, and us. I ask you to give to your church and by doing so I ask you to see that gift as a gift to both God and to each other. In our Christian community, God is alive, and the Holy Spirit is among us. Your gifts can help us continue to grow as we prepare for the coming of our Lord.

**SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT
NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2010

Greetings, Brothers and Sisters in Christ! I am pleased to share with you two new ministry opportunities and one new fund-raising effort, all of which were formally endorsed by the Vestry at our last meeting. First, Becky Adams presented a fund-raising opportunity for members of Trinity to buy—and to sell—Christmas greenery. This high-profit endeavor makes beautiful greenery available to us at a very reasonable price and of course helps raise money, which Becky has suggested we direct to the mortgage payments for our church home. I'd like to challenge you to join me in purchasing one of these items and sending it to another member of the congregation or to a loved one near or far. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we all shared the season with others *and* helped offset the cost of our building in this way?

Next, Christine Havens asked the Vestry to support a new ministry at Ridgeway Place which will involve a group from Trinity staying after Sunday social gatherings to prepare sack lunches to be delivered to residents who ask for them on Mondays, at which time one of the members of Trinity will lead those interested residents in a Bible study or some other spiritually-based discussion or activity. All seemed eager to support Christine in this endeavor, and all recognized the need for parishioners to provide ongoing support for this ministry by helping with sandwiches and/or programs. When we announce the beginning of this ministry, I hope you will join us after social hour on Sundays in preparing these meals. For those who wish to participate in programming, please visit with Christine.

Finally, the Vestry approved a proposal for a new model for Sunday School, which will begin in January. Linda Valentine and Mindy Davis worked with me to review a variety of curricula available for Sunday School, and in the end, we selected a program called *Saving Jesus Redux*, a video- and workbook-based curriculum. We chose this curriculum not only for its content but also because we hope that the multi-media nature of the materials will appeal to all ages in the church. *Saving Jesus Redux* features noted theologians discussing issues pertinent to all as a way of opening the conversation for Sunday School groups; ideally, we imagine meeting for an hour on Sunday mornings, devoting the first half-hour to prayer and to the video and the second half-hour to discussion. We'll publish more information about our exciting new Sunday School ministry as the start date approaches. We look forward to being joined each week by many of you for a discussion of the topics at hand, which we will publish a week ahead of time in the Sunday bulletin.

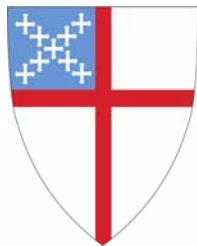
COATS FOR KIDS DRIVE

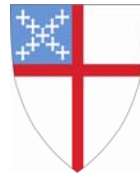

Wellness

According to the *Today* show, a recent survey by Fidelity revealed that more people put healthy finances over a healthy body on their list. It is important for total health and prosperity to focus on every aspect of your life, not just one. One is not more important than the other, or it will cause imbalance. Now is the time to focus on healthy finances.

Our attitudes and relationship with money have a significant effect on our overall health. President Heber J. Grant said, “If there is any one thing that will bring peace and contentment into the human heart, and into the family, it is to live within our means. And if there is any one thing that is grinding and discouraging and disheartening, it is to have debts and obligations that one cannot meet.”

Elder Marvin J. Ashton said that “proper money management and living within one’s means are essential in today’s world if we are to live abundantly and happily.” He discusses some key points to staying financially well. These include learning to manage money before it manages you, learning to use self-discipline and self-restraint in money matters, and using a budget to get out of debt and stay out of debt. It is also important to teach your children how to manage money and avoid debt while they are young. Remember what President N. Eldon Tanner says about money as you strive for financial wellness: “It is not the amount of money an individual earns that brings peace of mind; it is having control of his money.”

10 Essential Steps to Financial Wellness

Live beneath your means: This is the first rule to establishing financial independence. Living by this rule will allow you to reach your financial goals faster, and with a lot less stress.

Pay off your credit cards: Credit cards are usually the most expensive form of debt. Commit yourself to always paying more than the minimum required on your credit card. You’ll save incredible sums of cash by paying off credit card balances.

Pay yourself first: By making yourself the first “creditor” paid, you’ll develop solid saving habits that will help you reach your long-term goals.

Save six months living expenses: It’s critical to have a “rainy day” fund. For most people, six months of living expenses will provide an adequate cushion to weather most unexpected financial storms.

Make a will: This is an essential step for all adults, especially those with dependents.

Seek wise counsel: Don’t try to go it alone when making tough financial decisions. Consider the services of a fee-only financial planner. A top-notch financial planner can help you to establish a lifelong financial plan.

Fund company-sponsored savings plans to the maximum: Through payroll deduction and often tax-deductible contributions, you can accumulate significant savings in company-sponsored plans.

Plan major expenditures: If a house, new car, college education, or other large purchase is in your future, take the time to make a plan to reach your desired goal. A little planning goes a long way.

Educate yourself: Read financial publications and consider taking a course on basic financial management or investing. Community colleges often offer excellent courses on personal finance topics.

Review progress: Every year, list the value of what you own and what you owe. The difference between the two numbers is your financial net worth. Save this list, date it, and compare it to your current year’s progress. You’ll be amazed at how much difference a year makes in your finances.

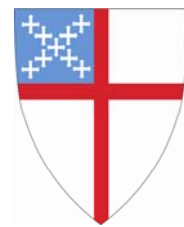
